Sport and recreation in Carseldine Urban Village

Sport and recreational uses are key to the Carseldine Urban Village and EDQ is seeking your input to improve the facilities. The precinct has a minimum of 3.6 hectares of open space dedicated to sport and recreation activities which could include up to four large fields of varying sizes for different sports, children's play equipment and/or fitness equipment. EDQ would like to know what the community would like to see, now and into the future.

A co-use design for sporting groups and the wider community will be developed depending on community need and suitability.

EDQ has already engaged with several sporting teams which use the recreation areas and is inviting the public to provide input via a short survey on haveyoursay.dilgp.qld.gov.au/carseldine. We encourage you to get involved and let us know your thoughts.

A sport and recreation engagement session will also be held on Sunday 21 May 2017 to help plan this new precinct. Carseldine Urban Village

Carseldine is aiming to be a model development with improved sporting facilities, high quality housing, community amenities, conservation and better access to Carseldine's natural bushland. Since the project announcement in October last year, EDQ has been engaging with the community on the urban renewal project.

Brisbane is experiencing an increasing population and the Queensland Government is implementing a sustainable and responsible plan for urban renewal. EDQ is working to balance the need to retain bushland and open space while creating places for homes and jobs.

More than 200 people have registered on <u>haveyoursay.dilgp.</u> <u>qld.gov.au/carseldine</u> to be involved in community engagement about the Carseldine Urban Village.





Community engagement workshops

In February, four community workshops were held and information on the proposed development was presented to the participants. This was followed by group discussions on key issues and concerns, with participants providing EDQ with thoughts, opinions and aspirations for the future of the site.

Thank you to the more than 70 people who attended and took part in the workshops. Your input will help inform the master plan for the Carseldine Urban Village and provide EDQ with a clearer direction on the development of the site.

Further work on areas of community concern is also being undertaken, including managing impacts on bushland and wildlife, as well as traffic and flooding.
